

DANCE AND RELAX AT JAZZ IN THE PARK FESTIVAL NEXT WEEKEND



Backed by popular demand, the annual Jazz in the Park Festival will transport concert goers to Paris for the third year in a row as live musicians deliver sweet, rhythmic tunes for two summer nights. The free event will take place 6 to 10 p.m. Friday, Aug. 2 and 5 to 11 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 3.

Since the event's inaugural year in 2017, this free music festival — sponsored by La Gitana Pizzeria and the City — has brought family and friends together to enjoy the summer evening while listening to relaxing music, dancing, and relaxing under the stars with about 1,000 people attending last year's event.

Now in its third year, Pizzeria La Gitana owner Marian Licxandru anticipates an even stronger turnout this year with multiple musicians on deck, a dance floor, beer and wine garden, and relaxing ambiance with gas fire pits, patio heaters, and string lights. He recommends bringing your family and friends, picnic baskets, blankets and to be prepared to be transported to a vacation state of mind.

The Friday lineup will include El Cajon, Choro Tomorrow, and Swing Strings, while the Saturday Lineup will include Black Satin, Jessica Blinn Quartet, Eden Lane Quartet, Vendredi's Bag, and LaVon Hardison Quartet. All of the musicians on in the lineup regularly play at one or both of La Pizzeria Lagitana's locations.

Hardison performed at the first jazz festival and sings jazz standards, originals and covers.

Many of her tunes are derived from songs found in the Great American Song Book. Training in the Boston Lyric Opera and performing in dramatic and musical theater, she has since been a featured performer at the festival of World Sacred Music in New Delhi, India. Hardison won the Seattle-Kobe Sister Jazz Vocalist Audition which prompted her to perform in Kobe, Osaka and Tokyo. Along with her performances in Japan, Hardison has performed in Oregon and Massachusetts.

Jazz in the park was the first music festival to make its way to Yelm City Park three years ago and since then, the park has undergone many improvements, including the newly constructed splash pad and playground equipment. This event and among many other newly established community gatherings have made the park a destination in the heart of our community. We hope you join us for relaxing summer evening filled with great music!

We continue to comply with everything being asked of us by the State and County to get the splash pad online and open! We've submitted the Operation Manual to the State and County Health Department, which is currently under review. We received the as built drawings from the contractor and personally delivered three copies to the Department of Health.

While we await approval from Thurston County, we are retrofitting the existing shed to safely store chemicals, repairing a drinking fountain at the Community Center, upgrading the signage around the park, and installing trashcans around the playground and splash pad.

Most of the temporary fencing has been removed, aside from a small section near the pavilion that will remain fenced while the grass takes root but the rest of the area is open for all to enjoy.

We are currently working with the Thurston County Department of Health to get their final inspection underway. This inspection, in conjunction with obtaining an operating permit, is essentially the last step before we are allowed to open the splash pad.

Thank you for your patience as our team works tirelessly with multiple agencies to get the entire park online. We are finally seeing light at the end of this County tunnel! Updates will be posted on our City of Yelm - Government Facebook page and www.yelmwa.gov

CITY PROVIDES PIT STOP FOR 8,000 SEATTLE TO PORTLAND CYCLISTS

Thousands of Bicyclists ride through Yelm every year to complete the incredible accomplishment of cycling more than 200 miles from Seattle to Portland and the City of Yelm is proud to support them as they peddle through our City.

For the third consecutive year, the Yelm City Park and Community Center served as an official 'mini stop' at mile marker 73 to provide racers snacks, drinks, first aid and space for bike repairs. The stop was sponsored by KIND Snacks, in partnership with Cascade Bicycle Club, Yelm Community Schools Sports Medicine and FFA Alumni, and the S. E. Thurston Fire Authority. Locally grown fruit, vegetables, and handmade products were also available at the Yelm Farmers Market.

The Public Works Department did a great job of posting clear signage to help direct cyclists through town, while our Police Department did an outstanding job of directing motor and bicycle traffic to ensure the safety of all travelers.

The Seattle to Portland bike race also provides an opportunity for the Yelm Community Schools Sports Medicine Program to work alongside the S. E. Thurston Fire Authority as they treat injured cyclists, providing them with real-world medical experience. Students were on hand to treat minor abrasions, strains, and blisters while the Fire Authority was there to provide backup for more serious injuries.

Thank you again to all of our residents and commuters for your patience and caution as these cyclists traveled through our City.

SENIOR ACCOUNTANT APPOINTED INTERIM FINANCE DIRECTOR



The City of Yelm recently appointed Heidi MacDonald as the interim finance director.

Heidi was hired as the senior accountant for the City in September of 2017 and played a key role in the recent accomplishments of the finance department, including the Government Finance Officers Association Distinguished Budget Award for transforming the city's budget into a comprehensive document, guided by the city's mission, vision, values, goals, and financial policies – established in 2016.

Her expertise was instrumental in working alongside the State Auditor's Office to ensure all

financial records were updated and consistent with the City's bank accounts, leading to an unmodified opinion for the fiscal years 2015 through 2017. She will continue run point in working with the State Auditor for the 2018 audit, which is scheduled for the end of July.

With Heidi at the helm, the city will continue to uphold and achieve these accomplishments made in recent years, while forging ahead to integrate operations of the finance and customer service teams at City Hall, implement stronger internal controls, and provide council with monthly reports and quarterly budget updates.

Heidi graduated from Eastern Oregon University with a Bachelor of Business Administration in Accounting and an additional major in Leadership and Organization . Heidi brings experience from the special district and nonprofit sectors in preparing and presenting financial reports.

Heidi's team mindset will help renew the spirit of team work across our dedicated team of city employees and her experience will keep us on a positive path going forward.

MAYOR FOSTER AWARDED ADVANCED CERTIFICATE OF MUNICIPAL LEADERSHIP



Mayor JW Foster recently became one of just 300 municipal leaders in the state of Washington to have earned the Advanced Certificate of Municipal Leadership from the Association of Washington Cities (AWC), since the program's inception in 1997.

To earn this award, Foster completed more than 60 hours of training through a variety of AWC-sponsored workshops, and demonstrated an additional 30 hours of community service.

"Since joining the Yelm City Council in 2011, I've been taking advantage of the web-training, local seminars and conferences offered by the AWC to be the best leader I can be for our community," Foster said. "As an elected leader, it is important to utilize the education and support offered by the AWC to continue to expand skills in budgeting, planning, and leadership."

The AWC's Advanced Certificate of Municipal Leadership program provides elected municipal leaders with training to effectively operate within the law, plan for the future, secure and manage funds, and enrich community and staff relationships.

Foster moved to Yelm with his wife Nicki in 1996 to raise their four children and spent many years coaching youth sports teams, volunteering for Yelm Community Schools, and working with local service organizations on a variety of projects. He was appointed to the planning commission before being elected to the Yelm City Council in 2011 and reelected in 2015. Foster was elected Mayor in 2017 after being appointed in 2016 to replace Mayor Ron Harding, who left to take work in Oregon.

Foster currently serves on the Sports Medicine advisory committee and as Chair of the General Advisory Committee for Career and Technical Education for Yelm Community Schools. JW and Nicki also volunteer for the Nisqually Land Trust, Rotary Club of Yelm, and Lions Club projects.

"The path to Yelm's best future starts with a strong foundation in our local schools and organizations," Foster said. "It's always been a strong family value of ours to work with our neighbors to make our community better for everyone"

In addition to his local Mayoral duties and local involvement, Foster continues to engage at the regional level, serving as Vice-Chair of the Thurston Regional Planning Council, and engaging with other municipal leaders and military counterparts through the South Sound Military and Community Partnership.

The AWC is a private, nonprofit, non-partisan corporation that represents Washington's cities and towns before the state Legislature, the state executive branch and with regulatory agencies. The AWC serves its members through advocacy, education and services.

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB AIMS TO OPEN YELM BRANCH SEPT. 4




With the school year quickly approaching, the Boys & Girls Club of Thurston County is seeking community support and donations to open the club on the first day of the 2019-20 school year.
